Lesson Five	Passive: accepting or allowing what happens or what others do, without active response or resistance. Aggressive: ready or likely to attack or confront; characterized by or resulting from aggression. Assertive: having or showing a confident and forceful personality.
Lesson Six	Immunity: the ability of an organism to resist a particular infection or toxin by the action of specific antibodies or sensitized white blood cells. Communicable: able to be transmitted from one sufferer to another; contagious or infectious. Virus: an infective agent that typically consists of a nucleic acid molecule in a protein coat, is too small to be seen by light microscopy, and is able to multiply only within the living cells of a host. Non-communicable: (of a disease) not able to be transmitted from one sufferer to another. Vaccination: treatment with a vaccine to produce immunity against a disease; inoculation. Anti-Vaxxers: a person who is opposed to vaccination, typically a parent who does not wish to vaccinate their child.
